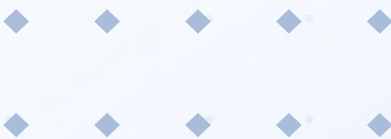
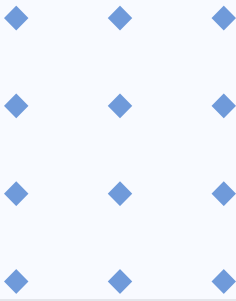

# How to Choose an ERP?

With dozens of ERP platforms promising similar capabilities, you may find it tricky to find the right fit. After all, it is a long-term commitment to your company's operational backbone. We recommend evaluating vendors against these six core criteria, assigning a Weight (%) to each based on your unique business priorities.

## 1. Functional fit & industry alignment

Does the platform handle your core processes out of the box? For example, a retail business needs high-volume SKU management, while a logistics firm calls for route optimization.

**Key check:** Can this platform handle 90% of our daily tasks without custom coding?

## 2. Localization & regulatory compliance

If you run your business across borders, 'standard' accounting isn't enough. You need automated tax compliance and localized reporting across all the countries where you operate.

**Key check:** Look for built-in tax engines (VAT/GST), multi-currency support, and accounting standards (GAAP/IFRS) of your primary regions.

## 3. Integration & ecosystem

Your ERP software must 'play' well with your existing tech stack.

**Key check:** Check for robust APIs and a marketplace of pre-built connectors for your CRM, e-commerce platform like Shopify, and 3PL providers.

## 4. Total cost of ownership

The license fee is just the tip of the iceberg. Beyond the sticker price, there are implementation, data migration, employee training, and ongoing support/maintenance costs.

**Key check:** What is the total projected spend over the next 36 months?

## 5. Scalability & multi-company support

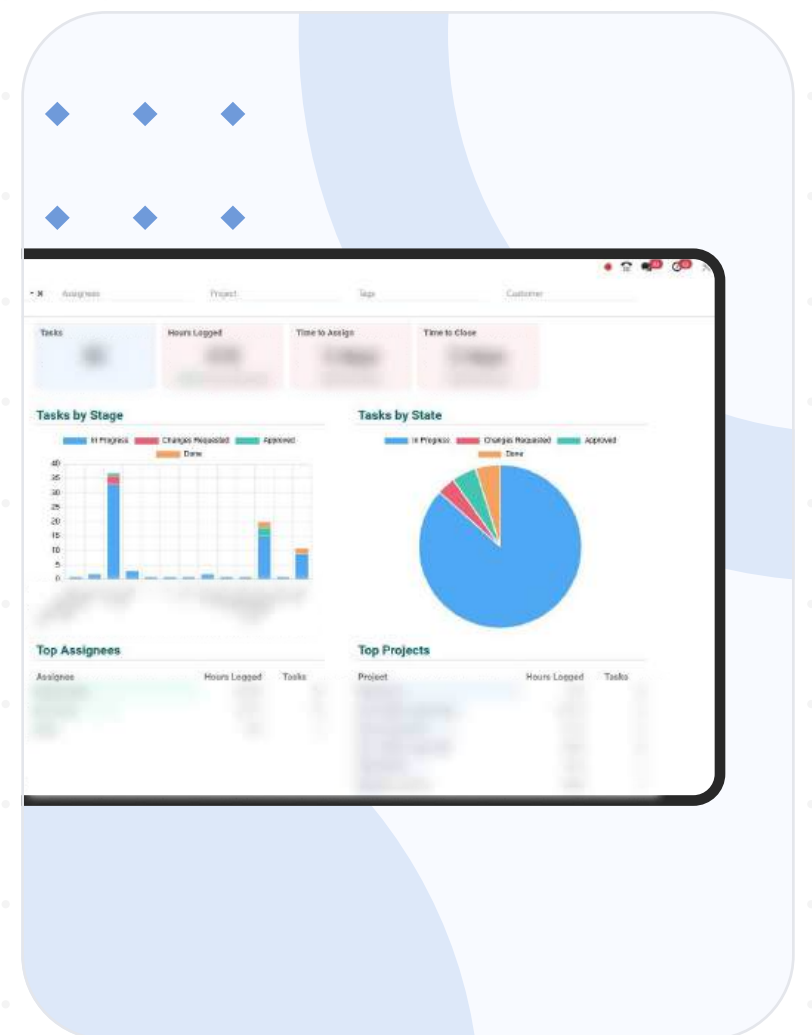
Your ERP software should be able to survive your next 5+ years of growth.

**Key check:** Verify how easily the platform handles new entities, additional warehouses, and increased transaction volumes without performance lags.

## 6. In-house IT maturity

You should be honest about your team's technical bandwidth. Some ERPs require a dedicated developer; others are click-to-configure.

**Key check:** Low-code/SaaS platforms are ideal for smaller teams, while highly customizable systems may require dedicated internal admins or external partners.



It is your objective tool for moving from subjective impressions to a quantitative choice. It ensures that "flashy" demos don't overshadow critical operational gaps.

Follow these steps to build your matrix:

- 1. Allocate a percentage to each of the 6 criteria based on your business priorities (the total must equal 100%)
- 2. Score each ERP (Odoo, Business Central, etc.) on a scale of 1-10 for every category
- 3. Multiply your rating by the weight (e.g., a 9/10 score on a 30% weight = 2.7)
- 4. Sum the weighted scores to identify the system that best aligns with your strategic goals

One of the most debated decisions in software selection is where your data lives. For years, the industry has pushed a cloud-first narrative for its 'anywhere' access and zero-maintenance appeal. Yet, some SMEs still find peace of mind in total control of on-premises servers. Let's weigh the overhead of owning hardware against the agility of a subscription.

## What is on-premises ERP?

On-premises ERP runs on physical servers under your direct control (in your office or a private data center). This setup grants your organization complete authority over the entire software environment and data security. However, that autonomy requires you to manage the significant upfront capital investment and the ongoing technical burden of maintaining the hardware and infrastructure.

Your IT team (or a dedicated partner) is responsible for:

- Purchasing and maintaining all physical hardware
- Manually installing software updates and new version releases
- Managing backups, cybersecurity protocols, and ensuring uptime
- Configuring networks and VPNs for remote user connectivity

## What is cloud-based ERP?

Cloud-based ERP (aka SaaS ERP) is hosted on the vendor's infrastructure and accessed securely via a web browser. This model replaces heavy upfront hardware costs with a recurring subscription, allowing your team to log in from any location with an internet connection. By offloading the underlying technical management to the provider, you trade deep hardware control for minimal IT maintenance and a much faster path to going live.

The provider is responsible for:

- Maintaining servers and ensuring high availability
- Automatically applying security patches and software upgrades
- Handling routine backups and disaster recovery protocols
- Providing native access from any device with an internet connection

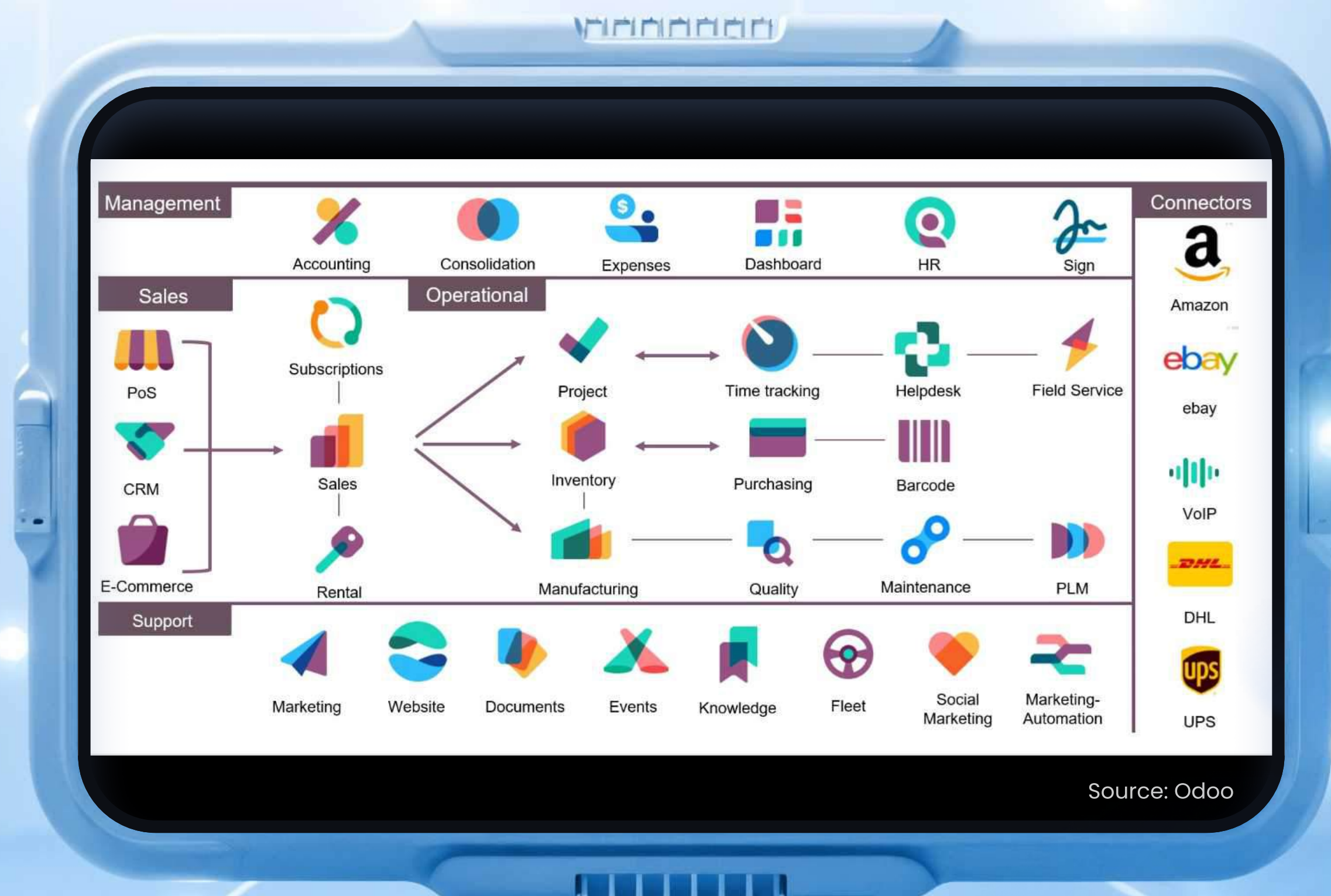

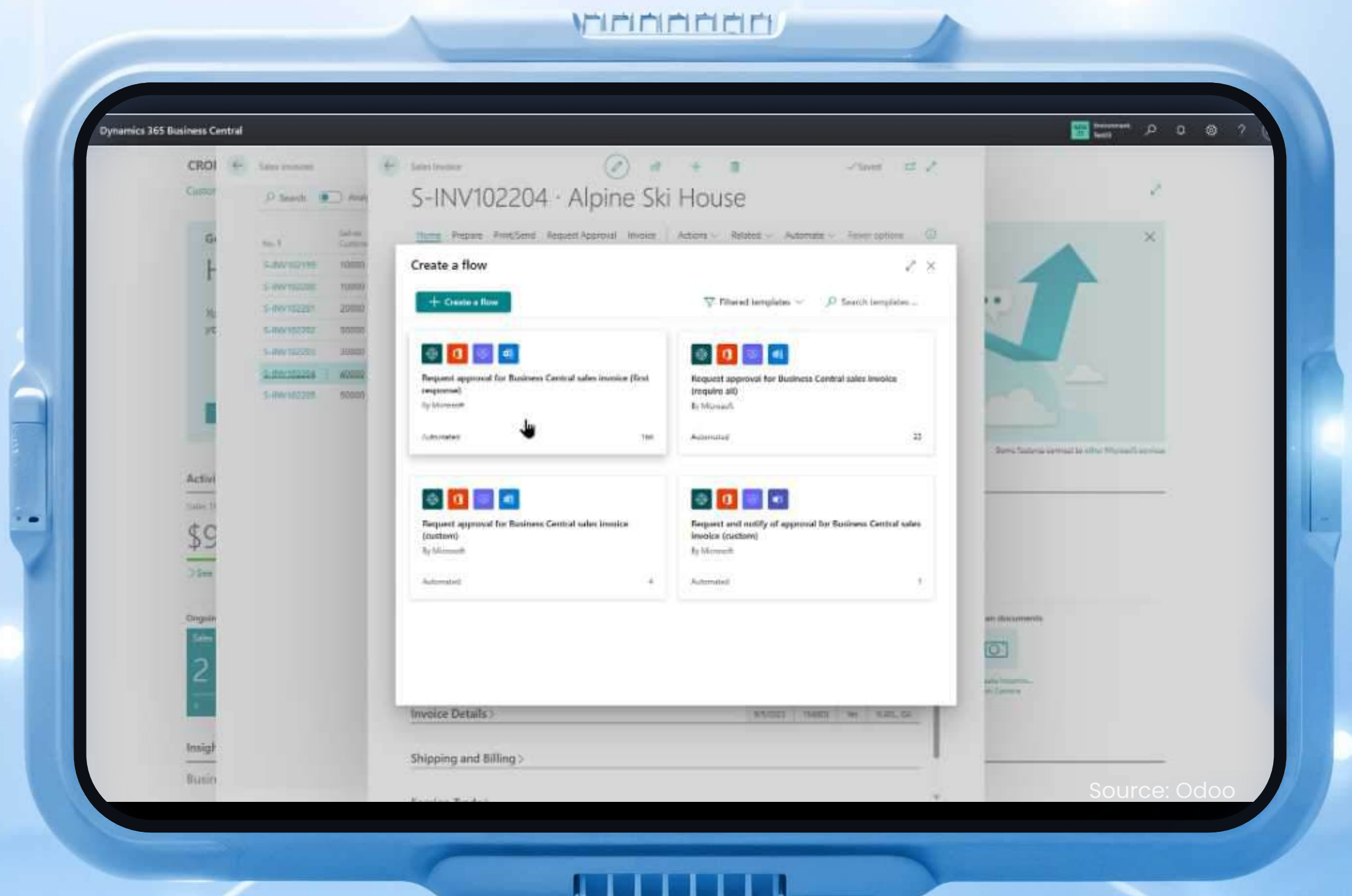

Selecting ERP software is a 5-to-10-year commitment that impacts every facet of your organization. To maximize your return on investment, prioritize a system your team will really use. Given that the risk of a non-fit is particularly high for SMEs, you should be cautious with your choice.

## Choose process mapping over software demos

You need to document your current as-is processes and identify the to-be goals before looking at features. Never let a vendor's sales pitch dictate your internal workflows. You can use a ranking system (like the MoSCoW method) to distinguish between critical "must-haves" and optional "nice-to-haves" to avoid over-complicating the selection.

## Calculate the total cost of ownership

SMEs often fall into the trap of only budgeting for the license fee. The 'sticker price' is often just 20-30% of the total investment over five years. You should always include data migration, custom development, third-party integrations, and internal staff time into the price.

## Prioritize out-of-the-box fit

The closer a system matches your needs natively, the lower your long-term risk. You should choose a system where 80% of your needs are met by standard features. And if you are operating in a highly regulated or specialized niche (e.g., Food & Beverage with strict lot-tracking), check out the system's native capabilities. It's always better when software has the necessary logic built in.

## Evaluate the product and the partner

For SMEs, the implementation partner can be more critical than the software itself. You will be working with this team for 3–12 months, so ensure their project management methodology (Agile vs. Waterfall) aligns with yours.

## The Red Flag Checklist

Avoid any vendor or system that:

- Claims they can go live in under 30 days for a complex business
- Refuses to show you a sandbox or demo environment with your own sample data
- Pushes for heavy customization before you have even tried the standard features
